


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# **CMA Board meet in Balmoral**

The CMA Board had their April meeting at the township of Balmoral last week.

Meeting in one of our regional town continues the Board's focus on having most of its meetings across different locations in the Glenelg Hopkins catchment area. Meeting in our towns provides an opportunity to meet with the community and relevant agency staff over lunch, talk, and have field visit to discuss local issues and achievements.

For Balmoral the focus was on environmental water, and the way in which the Glenelg Hopkins CMA delivers it to the Glenelg River. As part of the day's activities, other than the meeting, Board members visited the Rocklands Reservoir to look at the carp screens in action and look at the dam infrastructure. Rocklands Resevoir is a significant water storage in our region, and is the only means to provide environmental water to the Glenelg River. CMA Board members and staff were taken on the tour by GWMWater Managing Director, Mark Williams and staff who manage the Reservoir.

# **Bromfield Street weir removed**

Warrnambool's Bromfield Street weir has been entirely removed from the Merri River this month.

Built in 1907 this decommissioned weir was first identified as a major fish movement barrier in the waterway as far back as 1999.

This has been a long term project in returning the Merri River to a natural flow state and another major step toward opening the waterway up for both fish migration and recreation activities.

With the weir now gone, the next step is revegetation of the banks and allowing the waterway to find its natural levels again.





#### **Glenelg River mouth opened**

On Thursday 18 April staff from Glenelg Hopkins CMA, Parks Victoria and DEECA Forest Fire Management undertook an authorised river mouth opening on the Glenelg River estuary at Nelson. Works were coordinated in response to current and future flooding impacts, and to balance the environmental, social, economic, and recreational values of the estuarine system.

The Glenelg River estuary had been closed over recent weeks, which is a natural feature of this intermittently closed estuarine system. The CMA had been monitoring the system closely, with the hope that a natural estuary opening would occur. Unfortunately, this did not happen, as challenging autumn swell and tidal patterns created a very large sand bar/beach berm at the mouth which posed significant flooding and safety impacts on the estuary.

Opening conditions were safe, appropriate and Effective; and works were undertaken under state legislation and Victorian Waterway Management policy delegation.

## Beach Road works finishing up - fish and traffic access return

The Beach Road project at Nelson is nearing completion ... ironically the final stages were held up a bit due to naturally elevated water levels in the Glenelg estuary ... which is basically the main reason we are raising the road! This project is essential for improving access and managing the natural estuary in the area by ensuring that the public can enjoy the natural values throughout the year.

The fish-friendly culvert assembly provides native fish access to over 700 ha of freshwater wetlands of the Long Swamp wetlands complex.

Specially designed baffles make sure the water doesn't gush through the outlet and assists fish passage.

Beach Road is currently open to the public with reduced speed controls in place.

### CMA NEWS: Bat tracking at Bat's Ridge completed

The Arthur Rylah Institute has completed its second and final round of Southern Bent-wing Bat GPS tracking at Bats Ridge, Portland. This work is part of our Reversing Decline of the Critically Endangered Southern Bent-wing Bat project, funded by the Victorian Government. The tracking data is now being analysed ahead of the findings report being prepared.

Once the report is finalised, ARI will present its findings to the local community in Portland later this year.

# It's Cocky Count time -Saturday 4 May


The South Eastern Red - Tailed Black Cockatoo Recovery Project Team is currently seeking volunteers to assist in the 2024 annual count for the spectacular SE Red-tailed Black-Cockatoo.

Cocky Count day is on Saturday 4 May.

There are a number of sites in stringybark forest waiting to be traversed for cockatoos, from Keith to Mount Gambier in SA, and Nelson to Little Desert in Victoria.

You can get your own group together or when you register, ask to join in with others. You don't need any prior experience, but need to know what the cockatoos look and sound like. For those that need some additional support, a count training video and session are available online.
